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The Purple Bandana

The following is an essay written by Matthew Karrels, reflecting on his 2022 Verendrye trip.

"Good God, what is that smell?" asked my mother as she rifled through my laundry bag. I'd just returned from my final year at camp, and was now reluctantly unpacking and filing away the past summer's memories—letters I had received, my trusty crocs, a bucket hat—into various shelves and drawers. Discovering the source of the stench, she reached into the depths of my bag and procured what appeared to be a pelt made from purple roadkill — a bandana. Stained, frayed, irrevocably crumpled, the bandana proclaimed itself a candidate for the trash: however, I could never let that happen. No, this sweat-and-smokesmelling rag was my encyclopedia of the past summer's events.

100 Years Ago, Waboos Arrived at Camp

Pete Hare gave the following Sunday Circle talk during the summer of 2023.

lust one week ago all of you arrived at camp. Most of you came by car, some by bus from New York City, and a few of you by plane. When Alfred Hare (a.k.a. Waboos), director of Keewaydin from 1946-2000, arrived at camp as an 8-year-old in 1923, he didn't come by any of those means of transportation. He came by train from Philadelphia to Brandon, VT and then by an open truck to Lake Dunmore! Back in those days, nearly all the campers came by train—from Pittsburg, York, PA, Baltimore, Philadelphia and New York. Staff would be sent down from Vermont to be chaperones. An overnight train, the journey probably had the feel of the trip to Hogwarts in Harry Potter.

In 1923, there was no Annwi, Wiantinaug or Moosalamoo just Waramaug. The "Waramaug Wigwam of Keewaydin" was started in 1910— an offshoot of Keewaydin on Lake Temagami in Ontario. In 1917, Wiantinaug was established, in part as a martial training program, as the country was readying to get involved in World War I. Moosalamoo was founded in 1924, and Annwi several years after that.

Young Alfred fell in love with camp that first summer. With his home life somewhat unsettled—his parents would soon divorce, something uncommon in those days—camp became a safe haven for him. In his first summer at camp, he was dubbed "Waboos" by the director, Major Gunn, who saw this blonde-white hair and knew immediately that Waboos (meaning "white rabbit" in Ojibwe) was the perfect nickname for the young Hare.

He went on trips—the big one was a nearly three-week adventure to Lake George and back, paddling off from the shores of Dunmore and traveling along the Leicester River, the Otter Creek and part of Lake Champlain before arriving at the stunning Lake George. But sports were his first love—especially baseball. In those days, baseball was king, campers and staff playing nearly every day. In 1932, he was awarded best athlete in Moosalamoo.

He joined the Waramaug staff in 1933, where he ran boxing and baseball, and, before long, started a theater program that eventually became the Friday Night Frolics, for which he wrote the song "Keewaydineesi." His hero as a young staff was the camp director, Sid Negus. Sid was a larger-than-life character with a great sense of humor, a deep knowledge of the animal kingdom and the natural

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world, and a bit of a mischievous streak. The staff adored him. Then in 1940, the breakup of the Keewaydin Camps Corporation led to John "Speedy" Rush taking over for Sid Negus, and in 1945, his heart broken when his son was killed in World War II, Speedy decided to sell the camp.

The stars were aligned when Abby Fenn, one of Waboos's closest staff friends, met up with Waboos in July of 1945, while both were serving in Europe during World War II. Waboos was stationed in France, Abby in England, and the two had heard the rumor that Speedy was selling Keewaydin. Abby made a trip over to Paris and met Waboos. They stayed up most of the night discussing the fate of their beloved camp and talked themselves into making Speedy an offer. They later brought their plan

to Slim Curtis, another staff friend. Soon the three of them made their pitch to Speedy and he accepted.

The rest is history! Waboos went on to be the director from 1946-2000 — more than 3,000 campers recruited, approximately 1,200 staff hired, countless Kickers read, songs led, Algonquin and Verendrye trips greeted, old staff/new staff games played. But most important was his understanding of human nature, of finding the best in every person and bringing the best out of them. The result was a happy camp, a trusting camp, a place where people were the best versions of themselves, a place of fun and friendship, with a powerful sense of belonging.

A few nights ago, during the Friendship Fire Ceremony, we heard the Keeper of the Fire say the following words:

"So feel that spark inside of you, and pledge to breathe upon it,

Honor bound to see it burn forevermore.

For Keewaydin is a fire, warming all who stand beside it extinguished if neglect should cool its core.

"It takes us all, committed to the flame And here we are, committed to the flame

"Each summer, we return, like the fires that burn before us

Lit again, within this circle, casting light into our life.

And as the warm wind settles on our shores,

We rejoice in our arriving, always striving to live by our ideals

And if we hold on to that spirit, we will never lose the light.

Because we hold on to that spirit, Keewaydin will burn bright."

If Waboos were able to see us all here now, his heart would surely be warmed by knowing that Keewaydin is still burning brightly with this group of campers and staff.

Six weeks prior, seated around the campfire on a buggy July night, I had been presented with the bandana. It's a tradition for the senior-most campers at Keewaydin to embark on a seventeen-day voyage in Quebec's Verendrye Park, a trip I had eagerly awaited for seven years.

This trip of exalted lore would supposedly "make of us men," and was Keewaydin's rite of passage. Circling the fire, my friends and I waited with anticipation to be called as the members of the four different trip crews were announced. At my name's calling, leaping up to embrace the friends who would be my fellow trippers, I was first presented with the bandana. the while sporting our purple bandanas around our necks, foreheads, in pirate fashion, or babushka-style. And so, before even beginning our journey, the Royal Rangers had already formed an unbreakable unity and identity, and everyone in camp knew us by name. Throughout the seventeen days in the woods, my crew, looking like a horde of purple-bedecked Mardi Gras

In the fire's shadow, the pristine royal purple bandana bedazzled with white swirls and stars seemed to be cut directly from the cosmos. In the following weeks, the bandana branded itself onto my being; an irremovable mark distinguishing me and my crew from all others. Preparing for our voyage, the "Royal Rangers" did everything together: meticulously pack food and clothes, study maps, eat meals, loiter in the Adirondack chairs of the "Corral," all

goers, braved the Canadian woods and streams and portage trails and lakes and mosquitoes with our bandanas ever aiding us: shielding our faces from bugs and the sun, holding our hair, keeping smoke of our eyes, and catching sweat. The bandana had become more than a fashionable accessory: it had become equipment vital to my woodland existence.

Now, the bandana's marks carry the memories of the events of that trip. In zebra-like fashion, it is striped by light and dark lines, according to how it was folded: some parts sun-stained, others dark with grime and grit. A brown spot from a messy brownie bake, a tear from snagging a branch, a burn from a spray of embers, a stain from hard-worked sweat. My body has long lost the scratches, soreness, tan, and calluses that it acquired on the trip, but the bandana keeps them. At home

in D.C., it's hard to imagine the brutal conditions of life in the wilderness. Amidst showers, clean clothes, and cars, I forget the sensation of sinking chestdeep in muskeg, carrying a canoe on my shoulders, paddling twentyfive miles in the frigid rain, and desiring only a warm meal. But the purple bandana. proudly displayed on a shelf in my bedroom. transports me

to that alien reality. I smell the spruce trees, hear my trip leader's walk-up call, "Good morning Royal Rangers!" and remember whispered conversations after dark in the warmth of sleeping bags inside tents. Though the Royal Rangers reside across America, from Los Angeles to Denver to New Jersey, the purple bandana is the chronicle of our arduous journey, and reminds me of the deep brotherhood I share with them —forged by our survival in sylvan bliss.
